THREE GENERATIONS OF WHOLESUM FAMILY VALUES

The family pioneer, Miguel Crisantes Gatzionis, migrated from Greece to Mexico in the 1920s. In 1930, he started farming in Sinaloa, where his son, Theoary Crisantes, would later become an organic farming trailblazer. After transitioning the family's farms to only organics and sustainable practices, Theoary passed down the fields to his three sons — Theoary, Jr., Ricardo, Adrian (1976–2014) — and son-in-law, Jonathan Alarcon.

Today, management is shared between Ricardo and Theoary, Jr. with Theoary, Sr. on hand to lend his more than 60 years of experience in growing organic vegetables. Our Fair Trade farms are located in both the US and Mexico where we grow the finest organic tomatoes, cucumbers, squash, bell peppers and eggplant for families everywhere.

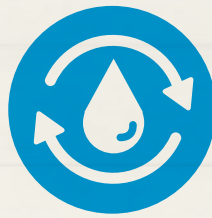
- Built a family park

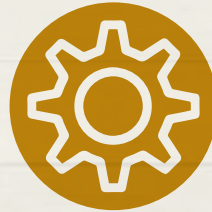

Sustainably Grown

Wholesum Harvest believes the healthiest, most flavorful produce is also grown responsibly. That's why we meet present needs without compromising future generations' abilities to meet theirs.



INNOVATION IN LOGISTICS

In Spring 2016 we began an innovative partnership with CHEP to ship 100% of our product on reusable pallets, keeping more than 22,000 lbs of waste out of landfills every year. Our pallet program is also the first Certified CarbonNeutral® pallet program in North America, with carbon offsets coming from a project that helps provide 30,000 families in rural Mexico with clean burning cook-stoves.

ENERGY-EFFICIENT LIGHTING

In 2016 we changed 353 compact fluorescent and incandescent bulbs to LEDS for an energy savings of more than 61,000 kWh per year at our three farms and warehouse. We also installed motion sensors in places like bathrooms and storage areas that are not continuously occupied.

CLOSING THE DOOR ON ENERGY LOSS

In October 2016 we installed the first sensor-activated automatic dock door system in southern Arizona. The doors shut automatically when a truck pulls away which will help us keep more cold air inside our warehouse, reducing energy use by up to 12%.

BAT ADVOCATES... OR BAT-VOCATES!

Bats are the most underrated part of the ecosystem! They are voracious eaters of many agricultural pests, providing about \$3 billion a year worth of pest control to US agriculture alone. They are also the exclusive pollinators of many desert plants, including the agave and the saguaro. This year for Earth Day we installed bat houses on all three of our farms to promote natural pest control and support habitat for these valuable animals.

RESTORING OUR LAND

As organic farmers, we recognize the importance of restoring the ecosystem around our farms to improve nutrient cycling, promote pollinator health, control erosion, keep out weeds, and suppress pest pressure. That's why in 2016 we began planting blooming buffers along our fields and replanting native grasses on erosion-prone soil. We also worked with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service to develop a comprehensive conservation plan for our farm in Amado, becoming the first organic producer in Arizona to do so.

COMMITTED TO PROGRESS

Wholesum Harvest has been a member of the Sustainable Food Trade Association since 2009 and our sustainability manager has served on its Board of Directors since 2015. As a member, we are committed to sharing best practices in sustainability and to continually improving in our efforts as a socially and environmentally conscientious company.
